



Lone-Parent Families

Across Canada, female led loneparent families, along with indigenous, racialized, recent immigrants, and families affected by disability, are disproportionately affected by poverty. 1 in 4 families in Saint John is Lone-Parent

The current rates of income poverty are unacceptable. However, there are policies that would go a long way in addressing the problem.


In 2013, the poverty rate for seniors in New Brunswick was 7.1%, down sharply from 23.8 % in attributed to transfer programs that include a universal component (Old Age Security), a negative income tax piece (the Guaranteed Income Supplement) and an earnings related pension (the Canada Pension Plan). In other words...

Taxation and transfer policies have a huge impact on poverty rates.

It's time to address child poverty with similar focus and political will.

A Note on Measuring **Poverty:**

"Statistics Canada produces several measures of low income, including the Low Income Cut-Off (LICO) Before & After Tax, the Market Basket Measure (MBM) and the LIM Before & After Tax. Because Canada does not have an official income poverty threshold, discussions about poverty can cause debates about the prevalence of poverty and the effectiveness of policy measures." -Campaign 2000

Campaign 2000 recommends the Low Income Measure After-Tax be adopted as Canada's official poverty line, and so do we!
