

EVERYONE COUNTS 2021: FREDERICTON

Highlights from the Point-in-Time Homelessness Count




A Point-in-Time (PiT) Count is used to capture a current snapshot of homelessness in a community. It involves a tally of people experiencing homelessness at emergency and domestic violence shelters, transitional housing, and unsheltered locations. It also involves a survey that sheds light on local lived experiences of homelessness and service needs. The findings help communities track progress in reducing homelessness. A PiT Count is limited as it occurs at a specific moment in time and cannot capture hidden homelessness (e.g., couch surfing). The following data is derived from a PiT Count conducted in Fredericton in April 2021.



Unsheltered / Sleeping Rough (33%) Emergency Shelter / Domestic Violence Shelter (52%) Transitional Shelter / Housing (15%)



The latest PiT Count survey data reveals that in a span of 12 months...

72% visited an emergency room at least once

(72% = 39 people)

44% were hospitalized at least once

(44% = 24 people)
